DEAR PARENTS

FAMSA PRETORIA

Defining family

The family is where you put down your first roots, where you form your most lasting impressions, where you put together the building blocks of your character. Family is where you learn to laugh and where you are allowed to weep without losing respect. Family is where you learn how to share, how to relate, and how to treat other people. It is where you discover how to draw the line between right and wrong, between good and evil. (By **Charles R. Swindoll**) Dysfunctional families blur that line, and boundaries become unclear. Solid, secure families have a clear view of the difference so that its members have little ethical confusion.

The family is the most important social unit of society. This is a fact that everyone must learn. The family is not only the basic societal unit. It is also the basic child-raising unit, the basic communication unit, and the basic all-around fun and friendship unit.

Characteristics of a healthy family

The members of the household are committed to one another.

A healthy family spends time together.

A healthy family enjoys open, frequent communication.

The healthy family turns inward during times of crisis.

Members of a healthy family express affirmation and encouragement often.

The members of a healthy family share a spiritual commitment.

The member of a healthy family trusts each other and values the trust they earned. When the families are strong, society is strong. When families are weak, societies begin to break down.

Dysfunctional families

Millions of children are not fully protected. Many of them deal with violence, abuse, neglect, exploitation, exclusion and/or discrimination every day. Such violations limit their chances of surviving; growing, developing and pursuing their dreams. No set rules- everyone for themselves. No positive and meaningful communication. Abuse of power. No respect. No family time.

Responsibilities of a family:

Building the child self-esteem

Bringing up a child to be a responsible adult

Children grow best in a loving family environment in which their best interests are always taken into account.

Sources of children's self-esteem problems lie primarily within the home. Each parent's own level of self-esteem can influences that of the child. Another source of children's insecurities is how the parents relate to each other and the nature of love shown to the child. Children who experience or witness violence often remain silent out of fear, shame or stigma. Some accept it as part of life, most is carried out by people children know and should be able to trust and look to for protection.

All children have the right to protection. They have the right to survive, to be safe, to belong, to be heard, to receive adequate care and to grow up in a protective environment. A family is the first line of protection for children.

The family helps the child to become a successful member of society; by teaching the child:

- Respect for self and others
- Communication skills: listening and responding without conflict.
- Positive attitude: learn to know that attitude can create a positive life.
- Honesty.
- Hard working: finishing tasks.
- Sense of humour: see the lighter side of life.

NO. 38 OF 2005: CHILDRENS ACT, 2005

PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND RIGHTS

- 18. (1) A person may have either full or specific parental responsibilities and rights in respect of a child.
 - (2) The parental responsibilities and rights that a person may have in respect of a child, include the responsibility and the right
 - (a) to care for the child
 - (b) to maintain contact with the child
 - (c) To act as guardian of the child, and

(d) To contribute to the maintenance of the child.

Parental Responsibilities and Right of Mothers

19. (1) The biological mother of a child, whether married or unmarried, has full parental responsibilities and rights in respect of the child.

Parental Responsibilities and Rights of Married Fathers

- 20. The biological father of a child has full parental responsibilities and rights in respect of the child-
 - (a) if he is married to the child's mother, or
 - (b) If he was married to the child's mother at
 - (i) the time of the child's conception
 - (ii) The time of the child's birth, or
 - (iii) Any time between the child's conception and birth.

Parental Responsibilities and Rights of Unmarried Fathers

- 21.(1) The biological father of a child who does not have parental rights and responsibilities in respect of the child in terms of section 20, acquires full parental responsibilities and rights in respect of the child-
 - (a) If at the time of the child's birth he is living with the mother in a permanent life-partnership; or
 - (b) If he, regardless of whether he has lived or is living with the mother-
- (i) Consents to be identified or successfully applies in terms of section 26 to be identified as the child's father or pays damages in terms of customary law;
- (ii) Contributes or has attempted in good faith to contribute to the child's upbringing for a reasonable period; and
- (iii) Contributes or has attempted in good faith to contribute towards expenses in connection with the maintenance of the child for a reasonable period.
- (2) This section does not affect the duty of a father to contribute towards the maintenance of the child.

Unmarried fathers

- They do not have automatic custody/ guardianship/ access and rights.
- Apply to court for the above mentioned rights.

Sexual Abuse

- Making them do sexual things against their will
- Physically attacking their sexual body parts
- Treating them like a sex object

Minimising, denying and blaming

- Making light of the abuse
- Not taking their concerns seriously
- Saying that the abuse didn't happen
- Shifting responsibility for abusive behaviour
- saying they caused the abused

Using isolation

- Limiting their outside involvement
- Controlling what they do, who they sees and talks to, what they reacts and where they goes
- Using jealousy to justify actions

Using Intimidation

- Aggressive looks
- Angry gestures
- Smashing things
- Destroying their Pets
- Displaying weapons

Using Emotional Abuse

- Putting them down
- Make them feel bad about themselves
- Calling them names
- Making them think their crazy
- Playing mind games
- Humiliating them
- Making them feel guilty

In conclusion it is the families' responsibility to protect, care, and love their children so that they grow to be responsible, reliable, successful, protective adults. When they are adults they will have the tools to build strong families which in turn builds strong society.
